You see the specific points. There will be five cities, not six, not four. There will be five. They will speak the language of Canaan. The suggestion is that the other cities don't. That might not be proveable, but it is a suggestion, and one of those five will be called the City of Destruction. There are three enormously specific things.

Well, you will find it hard to find evidences of fulfillment of any one of them.

Maybe the time is not yet. We will look at that in a minute. I just mention that right now you will find it hard to find a fulfillment.
